Course Information & Description:

Modality: Face-to-face, lecture, group work

Course Description: Continues the study of the processes and basic structures of ASL to provide an indepth understanding of the language and an ability to use the language more fluently. Sign grammatical principles are expanded and practiced. Understanding and appreciation for the Deaf Culture and Community is encouraged to enhance linguistic and cultural knowledge.

Prerequisites: ASL 120 American Sign Language I



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Course Objectives:

- To introduce continuing ASL students to expanded use of ASL, including vocabulary, handshapes, fingerspelling, numbers, and ASL grammar and sentence structures, with a focus on signing competence in daily social contexts.
- To provide students practice in authentic ASL conversations, both in small groups, as well as with the whole class to provide exposure to various signers.
- 3. To expose students to more/different aspects of Deaf culture and the Deaf community.

Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of ASL-220 American Sign Language II, the student should be able to:

- Understand 400 new signs in American Sign Language, including conjunctions, size-shape specifiers and more advanced classifier verb pairs, and produce them appropriately in topics such as family, daily activities, personal preference and needs.
- 2. Identify main ideas and supporting details from longer and more complex signed texts.
- 3. Understand more complex sentence structures, including conditional sentences and use of temporal aspects, and begin to use them correctly in communication.
- 4. Understand non-manual markers including comparative/conditional and adverbial uses, and use them to express physical and emotional states.
- Understand and use language functions such as offering/accepting help and offering advice to communicate effectively.
- 6. Begin to explore the various artistic uses of ASL such as storytelling, poetry, and sign-play.
- 7. Develop a greater awareness of and appreciation for the Deaf Culture and Community as well as develop an understanding of their own cultural values and beliefs.

Course Requirements

Class Attendance and Participation Policy

Attendance/Participation – 50 pts (8%): Attending every class is vital to learning the language and getting the appropriate amount of practice. For every class attended, you will earn 1.5 points towards your attendance/participation grade.

Assignments

Exams – 360 pts (68%): I will count the best 6 out of 8 exams taken. Each exam is worth 60 points. Be aware that there will be NO MAKEUPS given for missed Exams EXCEPT for extreme emergencies to be discussed with your instructor. If a makeup is granted, you must schedule it within two (2) class days of your return to class.

Culture Project – 50 pts (9%): Go to www.youtube.com and type in the title Deaf Mosaic #402. This video is about the <a href="Deaf President Now rally that happened at Gallaudet University in 1988. Watch it and write a 3-5 page paper on the video. Include a 2-3 page detailed summary of the video, a 1-2 page discussion of how the rally benefitted the Deaf community, and your thoughts or feelings about the video. If you do not turn your paper in on the day it is due, I will deduct 1 point from your grade for every day you are late.





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Video Lab Work – 75 pts (14%): Each student will be videotaped 3 times this semester. As a class, we will go to the Media Services studio in the basement of the Business Building during the appointed class time, and with a partner you will videotape a conversation using the vocabulary you have learned up to that point. I will give you feedback based on your video. If you miss class on the day of a video, you will only have 2 weeks from that class to make up the video. Each taping is worth 25 points.
